# A time for giving

Donated clock dedicated in downtown Howell

The Victorian-style clock that has stood in the lawn of the Howell Carnegie District Library since October was formally dedicated Saturday during a ceremony led by Mayor Geraldine Moen.

The clock, which stands 10 feet tall, was a gift from the Edward and June Kellogg Foundation in memory of Edward and June Kellogg, who were longtime residents of Howell.

The ceremony took place during the Howell History Days celebration. Representatives from the foundation were present to receive a proclamation from the mayor.

Sarah Tottingham, a trustee for the Edward and June Kellogg Foundation, gave a speech to explain the clock's symbolic meaning.

"The clock represents what was done in the past but what we can still do to create our future," she said. "It is a reminder that time is

our most valuable asset; use it wisely. Invest it in others and give it freely."

Tottingham said the Kelloggs spent many hours serving the Howell community throughout their lives. Edward Kellogg served on the Howell Public Schools Board of Education for more than 10 years, and the couple volunteered with several nonprofit organizations.

Their son, Timothy Kellogg, said his parents particularly loved working with kids and promoting education, which was a reason the clock was given to the library.

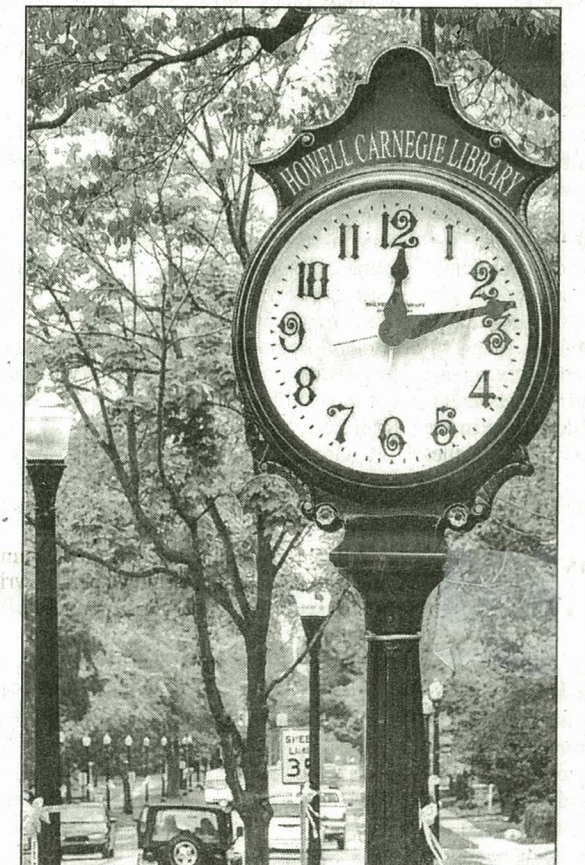
"Education was very important to them," Kellogg said. "Growing up, I probably spent at least one day a week at the library."

Library Director Kathleen Zaenger said the gift was a wonderful addition to the downtown area.

"It's beautiful," she said. "It's something everyone can enjoy, and it fits in with the Victorian era of downtown and the library."
